Our mission is to reinforce local governance and support community-based organizations that collaborate with their communities to improve quality of life by fostering intelligent, sustainable, and scalable systemic changes.

SCIS actively engages in synergistic initiatives across multiple sectors, including decentralization, agriculture and food security, the environment and climate change, health, nutrition, education, as well as arts and culture. Special focus is placed on the empowerment of women, youth, and vulnerable groups such as the disabled, children, widows, and the elderly.

As he famously stated in his iconic speech: "If we are to take advantage of the belief that all people desire peace, then the challenge is that people must come together and, if necessary, bypass governments—seeking solutions not through one single approach, but through a thousand ways by which individuals can gradually learn more about each other."

This approach translates global and national objectives into concrete actions within communities, cities, regions, and national territories, while considering the economic, social, cultural, and environmental specifics of each local context. Key aspects include:

1. Adaptation to Local Contexts:

While the SDGs are global in scope, their achievement necessitates a consideration of local realities. This means adapting goals and indicators to the specific needs and priorities of each territory, ensuring that global ambitions resonate on the ground.

2. Participation and Inclusion:

SCIS promotes a **participatory process**, where populations, local communities, local authorities, the private sector, and other stakeholders are actively involved in the planning, implementation, and evaluation of actions. This approach ensures that development is inclusive and reflects the needs of all groups within society.

3. Local Appropriation:

The success of this approach hinges on the **ownership** of the SDGs by local actors—municipal authorities, communities, and other stakeholders—who integrate these goals into their development plans. It is through this local appropriation that long-term change can be realized.

SISTER CITIES INTERNATIONAL SENEGAL - PRESENTATION

1) Local Governance

The primary objective is to support local governments and catalytic community organizations in their efforts to enhance the quality of life of their communities by fostering intelligent, sustainable, and potentially scalable systemic changes. Specific goals include:

- Supporting the Development of Decentralized Cooperation and Resource Mobilization: Contributing to the strengthening of decentralized cooperation mechanisms and actively seeking additional resources to support local development efforts.
- Supporting the Management of Transferred Skills and the Localization of Public Policies: Assisting in the management and effective application of transferred skills, as well as ensuring that public policies are tailored to the specific needs of local territories.
- Facilitating Engagement with Private Sector Actors and Central Government to Promote Investment: Acting as an intermediary to foster partnerships between local governments, private sector actors, and central government services to stimulate investment in local development.
- Facilitating Collaborative Relationships Between Local and State Actors: Promoting collaboration between local governments, state services, and other stakeholders to ensure the effective implementation of government programs and encourage territorial dialogue.
- **Implementing Performance Monitoring and Evaluation:** Developing systems to monitor and evaluate the performance of local initiatives, ensuring that they meet objectives and contribute to sustainable development outcomes.
- Localization of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs): Adapting and integrating the global Sustainable Development Goals into local contexts to ensure that development actions align with both global and local priorities.

2) Agriculture & Food Security

The overall research objective is to enhance household resilience in the face of food insecurity and sustainably increase their income. Specific goals include:

- Increasing Agricultural Productivity and Diversification: Supporting the adoption of improved inputs and appropriate technologies to boost agricultural productivity and diversify production.
- **Modernizing Agriculture:** Contributing to the modernization of agricultural practices through the introduction of innovative techniques and technologies that increase efficiency and sustainability.
- Strengthening the Capacity of Producers and Community-Based Organizations: Enhancing the skills and capacities of individual producers, grassroots community organizations, and producer groups to improve their production capabilities and market engagement.

• Promoting Agribusiness Development:

Encouraging the growth of agribusiness through a value chain approach, focusing on key sectors like agriculture and livestock to create added value and improve market access.

3) Environment and Natural Resources Management

SCIS aims to contribute to environmental protection, the sustainable management of natural resources, and provide effective responses to the challenges posed by climate change. Key areas of focus include :

 Support for the Creation and Management of Forests, Protected Areas, and Natural Sites of Interest:

Assisting in the establishment and management of forests, protected zones, and ecologically significant natural sites to preserve biodiversity and ecosystem health.

- Support for Developing and Implementing Environmental Action Plans, Emergency Response, and Risk Prevention:
 Contributing to the development of comprehensive environmental action plans, including strategies for emergency response and risk mitigation in the face of environmental threats.
- Support for the Protection of Ground and Surface Water: Promoting sustainable practices to safeguard groundwater and surface water resources, ensuring access to clean water for communities and ecosystems.
- Contribution to the Protection of Nature: Engaging in conservation efforts to protect ecosystems, wildlife, and natural habitats from degradation, while promoting sustainable resource use.
- Contribution to Waste Management: Supporting waste management initiatives, including recycling, waste reduction, and sustainable disposal methods to reduce environmental pollution.
- **Promotion of Research and Innovative Solutions for Climate Change Challenges:** Encouraging research and the development of innovative solutions to address the environmental impacts of climate change, with a focus on long-term sustainability.

4) Nutrition

SCIS aims to contribute to improving the nutritional status of vulnerable groups, including children aged 0 to 5 years, pregnant women, and breastfeeding mothers, among others. Key initiatives include :

- Screening and Management of Moderate Acute Malnutrition (MAM) in Children Under 5 Years: Implementing screening and management programs to identify and treat moderate acute malnutrition (MAM) in young children, ensuring timely intervention.
- Implementation of Weight Monitoring Systems for Children Under 2 Years Old: Introducing weight monitoring systems to track the growth and nutritional status of children under two, allowing for early identification of nutritional deficiencies.
- **Promoting Behavior Change:** Encouraging positive changes in dietary and healthrelated behaviors through community-based education and awareness campaigns focused on good nutrition and health practices.
- Promotion of Technical and Technological Innovations to Combat Global Acute Malnutrition: Supporting the use of innovative technologies and research, such as

predictive models, to better understand and reduce global acute malnutrition and improve nutritional interventions.

5) Health

The overall objective is to contribute to the reduction of morbidity and mortality, with a focus on vulnerable populations, as well as addressing non-communicable and chronic diseases. Key initiatives include :

- Improving the Quality and Availability of Information, Products, and Services: Enhancing access to high-quality health information, products, and services, ensuring that communities have the tools they need for better health outcomes.
- **Support for Community Ownership:** Empowering local communities to take ownership of their health initiatives, fostering active participation in health decisions and promoting sustainable practices.
- Improving Relationships and Collaboration Between Health Teams and Community Stakeholders: Strengthening cooperation between health teams, local leaders, and community stakeholders to ensure a coordinated and effective approach to health challenges.
- **Promoting Innovation in the Community Health Sector:** Encouraging the development and adoption of innovative health solutions that improve service delivery and address emerging health challenges at the community level.
- Enhancing Community Resilience to Health Emergencies and Developing Alert Systems: Strengthening community resilience by innovating in the implementation of health emergency response systems and developing effective community-based alert systems to address health crises.

6) Education, Literacy and Promotion of National Languages

SCIS aims to contribute to the establishment of universal basic education and the improvement of the quality of teaching and learning. Key initiatives include:

- Support for the Construction and Equipping of Socio-Educational Infrastructure: Assisting in the construction and furnishing of schools and educational facilities to create a conducive learning environment.
- Support for the Acquisition of Textbooks, School Supplies, and Teaching Materials: Facilitating access to educational resources by supporting the purchase of textbooks, school supplies, and teaching materials to enhance the quality of education.
- Support for the Operation of Educational Management Bodies: Strengthening the capacity of educational management bodies to effectively oversee and administer education systems at the local level.
- Support for the Development and Implementation of Illiteracy Eradication Plans: Promoting adult literacy programs and supporting the development of strategies to eliminate illiteracy, particularly in underserved communities.
- **Support for the Promotion of Inclusive Education:** Advocating for and supporting inclusive education practices that ensure equal access to quality education for all children, including those with disabilities.

- Support for the Promotion of Civic Values and Active Citizenship: Encouraging the integration of civic education into curricula to foster the development of responsible citizens who contribute actively to their communities.
- **Promotion of Sport in Schools:** Supporting the inclusion of sports and physical education in school programs to promote healthy lifestyles, teamwork, and the holistic development of students.

7) Crafts & Culture

The overall objective of SCIS is to contribute to the development of crafts and the promotion of a robust cultural industry, leveraging the opportunities offered by Senegal. Key initiatives include :

- Contributing to the Identification and Development of the Economic Potential of Crafts and Culture:
 - Mapping the craft and cultural potential of the territory.
 - Conducting territorial diagnostics to assess the needs of craft and cultural businesses.
 - Developing territorial strategic plans for the crafts and culture sectors.
 - Forward planning for job creation and skills development in the craft and cultural industries.
 - Promoting the development of craft and cultural professions, value chains, and businesses.

• Promotion of Artisanal and Cultural Value Chains:

- Promoting artisanal and cultural value chains within the territories to foster economic growth.
- Raising awareness of crafts and culture among the general public.
- Promoting local know-how and traditional skills.
- Development and Promotion of the Craft and Cultural Economy:
 - Supporting initiatives that strengthen the craft and cultural economy, positioning these sectors as key contributors to local and national economic growth.
- Support for Projects to Revitalize and Maintain Craft and Cultural Activities:
 - Assisting in the establishment and maintenance of craft and cultural activities tailored to local contexts.
 - Encouraging innovation through digitalization, new equipment, and services for craft and cultural businesses.
 - Providing support for training in craft and cultural professions to enhance skill development.
